Directions: In order to be successful on the AP US History DBQ, students must not just analyze documents in order to make claims about historical phenomena, they must also analyze them for Historical Context, Audience, Purpose, Point of View, and the Significance (Why is this source important?). For every document analyzed, you must perform a HAPPY analysis. Being able to identify each of the HAPPY components will prepare students for earning the extended document analysis points required for a high scoring DBQ essay.

HAPPY ANALYSIS OF PRIMARY SOURCES		
Н	Historical Context	Where and when as the source produced? Place it in the appropriate context – connect the document across time to earlier and later eras or across space to events happening in different places. Don't just focus on the year of the document - what else happened that year? How might this affect its meaning? What else can you remember that is NOT explicitly stated in the document, but could support the time and events surrounding the document?
Α	Audience	 Who is the author's intended audience? How might this affect the validity and reliability of the document?
Р	Purpose	 What is the author's purpose for creating this source? Why was this source produced – to persuade, to inform, as propaganda? How might all of this affect its reliability?
Р	Point of View	 What do you know about the author and his background? What role is he in at the time of this doc? What perspective does he have on the topic? From what point of view is he writing this doc?
Υ	Significance	 What main idea is the source trying to convey? Why is this source important in American History? Does it reflect change over time? Ask yourself, "So what?" in relation to the question asked. HOW and WHY does this doc support your thesis?
